Am I allowed to have chickens on my property and if so, what do I need to do and know?

Yes, if your intent is to have chickens as a pet and/or for fresh eggs (for personal consumption and/or non-profit), chickens are permitted as a by right accessory use in all districts. The size of your property determines the number of chickens, ducks, pigeons, geese and/or similar fowl you may have. The minimum lot area of 10,000 square feet (approx.1/4 acre) is required for two (2) chickens/related fowl, then 5,000 square feet (approx.1/8 acre) of lot area for each additional chicken/related fowl.

**You are also required by PA State law to obtain a manure management plan and/or application to have chickens and related fowl.

A zoning permit is not required to own chickens and/or related fowl noted above. However, you are required to have the chickens and related fowl to be confined to the property of the owner of the fowl (Z.O. Section 119-41.D(11)[d]).

**Steps for obtaining and applying for a manure management plan and/or application:

1. You can obtain manure management information, requirements and applications with the Monroe County Conservation District (MCCD).
